## CITIZENS ON PATROL

### VOLUNTEERS

Enforce Washington State parking regulations.

Are the eyes and ears of Law Enforcement and immediately report any suspicious activities in their patrol area without subjecting themselves to unnecessary danger.

Assist Law Enforcement with traffic control at auto collisions and participate in community activities and events.

Make security/vacation checks of private residences.

Impound abandoned vehicles in the county right of way.

Certify vehicles on private property as junk for “Scrap Only” sale and removal from the property.

## VOLUNTEER REQUIREMENTS

COP volunteers must be at least 21 years of age, live in Kitsap County or surrounding area and possess a valid drivers license.

All candidates are required to submit an application, participate in an interview, pass a background check and truth verification test.

Both on the job and class room training are provided.

Members are required to volunteer a minimum of 16 patrol hours a month, attend a monthly meeting and commit to a minimum of 1 year of service.

## HISTORY

The Disabled Parking Enforcement Volunteer program was started in 1999 when Sheriff Boyer, saw the need for additional staffing resources to help with the enforcement of disabled parking regulations and the willingness of citizens to volunteer their time to fulfill that need.
